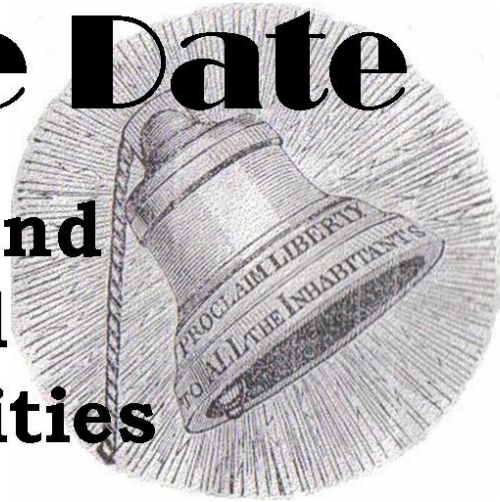

The Underground Railroad: a New Interpretation of an Old Story

On January 19 Paul and Mary Liz Stewart, Co-founders of Underground Railroad History Project of the Capital Region, Independent Scholars, and Scholars in Residence at Russell Sage College spoke about their research into Underground Railroad history period documents. These tell a very different version of the standard story/account that references Harriet Tubman, Frederick Douglass, dark of night escapes, and tunnels. Locally published newspapers, such as The Tocsin of Liberty and The Northern Star and Freeman's Advocate, provide documented accounts of the activities of Capital Region Underground Railroad abolitionists. Personal letters, such as the one written by Harriet Myers to John Jay, of the prominent Jay family, are rich with details about the provision of assistance to Freedom Seekers and the challenges confronted by local abolitionists. Records also indicate that many African American men and women held leadership positions among abolitionists. Henry Highland Garnet, Stephen Myers, Harriet Myers, Sarah and William Henry Johnson, are a few of those who risked prosecution under state and federal laws in their efforts to assist Freedom Seekers. They also dedicated their lives to insuring that all Americans, no matter what their heritage, had equal access to the promises contained in the Preamble to the founding document of this country. Theirs was a presentation that challenged us all to think a bit differently about this period in our state and nation's history and its relationship with us today.
